The Changing Face of the Harvest Festival

In Oct 1939 the U.K. government launched the "Dig for victory" project. Everyone was urged to grow food anywhere they could. Dig up the tennis court, or that little patch out back and plant some veggies.

I have warm memories of the harvest festival in Warmington Methodist Chapel. The victory was won but the veggies kept on coming. Every Autumn the harvest festival would celebrate the bounty from these efforts; with a spectacular display of produce, proudly on show around the front of the pulpit. The centrepiece would be the wheatsheaf loaf, baked to a bronze colour and glazed. My father was the village baker so I imagine he was involved. Later everything was sold by auction for the benefit of the chapel funds.

What will future Harvest Festivals look like? With climate change, extreme weather conditions and the global population ever increasing, the technical advancements in food production will be paramount. In the digital age we live in, "Multi-level Farming" may escalate.

Facilities with controlled environment, precise temperature, humidity, nutrition and LED lighting. The crops growing on shelving stacked in multiple layers, robotically planted and computer controlled. One such unit in Japan turning out 30,000 lettuce every day of the year, claiming zero carbon and water 98% recycled.

With "work at home" on the increase, empty office buildings could become farm factories, producing the harvest right in city centres, with minimal transportation to reach the consumer.

Meanwhile we give thanks to the Lord for the food on our table and pray the World Leaders be given the wisdom to orchestrate production and distribution of food Worldwide to the necessitous, so all may enjoy the harvest festival. **C D.**
